


# INTERMISSION


### Screen on the Green

## COUNCIL COMMENTARY

Church Council met Thursday, September 13, 2018. Linda Siegle shared a personal devotion to open the meeting.

Ron Herbanek presented a well-researched quote for heating repairs needed for the Choir Room, Gathering Area, and Men's Restroom.

Treasurer Susan Collins advised that CTS has had a positive cash flow for two months of the current year and the other six have seen negative cash flow. Our recent investment in the Lutheran Foundation of the Southwest Growth Fund is doing well.

Financial Secretary Samantha Clark reported that data for August 2018 are skewed from August 2017 because Hurricane Harvey caused the cancellation of services one August Sunday in 2017. Membership in our congregation is holding strong at 260 members.

Director of Music John Krueger has been busy on several fronts. The choirs are up and running, and some young people have joined the 11:00 a.m. Choir. John is working on an Advent Cantata based on the Tanzanian hymn "Bwana Anakuja" (Our Lord is Coming).

Director of Family and Youth Ministry Jason Thomas (J.T.) advised that this year's Rally Day will be September 16, 2018. CTS now has some of Pastor Jim's recent sermons on line via the CTS website ([christtheservant.net](http://christtheservant.net)). Each link contains a recording of a sermon along with the scripture text upon which the sermon is based. Excellent feedback is being received, including from some of our college students who now live out of town. Susan Collins who has been very active in Confirmation Classes will be stepping down from that responsibility, with Demi Edwards taking over for her. Pastor Jim, and Church Council, express our deepest thanks to Susan and happily let the record reflect that Susan's efforts in this ministry, a ministry providing a strong cornerstone of faith for the Confirmands, have been outstanding.

Pastor Jim reported that he has performed several baptisms, and that more are in line for coming worship services. Pastor Jim advised that he met with WHAM CEO the Reverend Mark Brown about partnering with CTS should we expand our food for the homeless program to providing a meal at CTS on an as yet undetermined schedule. For example, once a month or so. Thoughts are preliminary but this

appears to be a natural extension of our homeless ministry.

## WORSHIP AND MUSIC

Over the last several weeks, I have gotten the question of whether we are changing the music at Christ the Servant. Granted, we have begun to hear Tanzanian music during worship, and that trend will continue this fall with the introduction of one more Tanzanian hymn and with the Advent cantata.

There are four hymns from Tanzania in the current hymnal, and we now (as of September 30) have done all of them. One of them, "Christ Has Arisen, Alleluia" (ELW #364), has been done occasionally during the Easter season. This year, we added some basic percussion and used it as the sending hymn on Easter Sunday. In like fashion, "Gracious Spirit, Heed Our Pleading" (ELW #401) is a Pentecost hymn and was used on Pentecost. This is a seasonal usage of a hymn, which accounts for the hymn selection on all the major Sundays and feast days (such as Ash Wednesday) during the year. I will be introducing "We Have Seen the Lord" (ELW #869) during the offering as a sort of "mash up" (the old school term is quodlibet), where I run one tune into another. In this case, the tune will be the chorus of "O Lord, You're Beautiful." The theme, key and rhythm of the songs are similar, and the result will be a beautiful prayer that comes across like a Taizé song. Going forward, this can be used during communion as a song that can be done without paper, meaning it can be sung while in line.

The fourth song, "Listen, God Is Calling" (Neno lake Mungu, ELW #513), will be done for a third time this year as the opening hymn on Reformation Sunday. It has been sung once in a while during my fourteen years here, and was "reintroduced" this past spring. Since then, it came up as a possible hymn based on the Gospel reading and is suggested as a Hymn of the Day (sermon hymn) for Reformation. This suggestion came about because the song picks up themes from the Gospel reading and other major themes of the day, most notably baptism. Since Reformation Sunday is also confirmation (also known as "Affirmation of Baptism"), it is a great match. However, we will do the traditional "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word" as the sermon hymn, and close with "A Mighty Fortress." As a result, "Listen, God Is Calling" will be the opening hymn and will make a great processional.

This use of a hymn is based on the scripture of the day, which is the guiding force behind the great majority of the hymn selections at Christ the Servant. Selecting hymns in this way (and I also try to do that with choir anthems) results in most of my homework

as a church musician, and is my most valuable work. For one thing, it allows the congregation to interpret the readings by singing about them, and for another ensures that the same message is coming from the organ console (or choir risers) as is coming from the lectern and pulpit.

As for the Advent cantata, it will follow the pattern of my previous three cantatas by being based on an Advent hymn. However, this time it will be from another country. "Bwana anakuja" ("Jesus is Coming") picks up the themes of anticipation and healing that are so prevalent in the Advent season. Although I haven't finished the piece, I can guarantee that it will be more festive than meditative, and that all the words will be heard in both Swahili and English.

## TUESDAY NIGHT BIBLE STUDY

The Book of Isaiah will be the topic of discussion beginning on Tuesday Oct 2<sup>nd</sup> starting at 7:00 pm in the small conference room. We plan to cover Isaiah's major themes every other Tuesday over 5 sessions. Most of us are familiar with Isaiah Chapter 5:1-7 which begins with "Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill." There is so much more to Isaiah ... most of which is written in a poetic style where Yahweh is front and center dealing with the kingdom of Judah and the life of the world around Judah.

As you may know, there are three major divisions to the book of Isaiah: chapters 1-39 which are linked to the prophet who lived during 742 to 701 B.C.E. when the Assyrian Empire threatened Jerusalem, chapters 40-55 are dated around 540 when the rising Persian Empire displaced the domination of Babylon and chapters 56-66 are dated around 520 after the Jews had returned from exile.

In the bible study, we'll read highlights from all three Isaiahs, the last two of which are decidedly more optimistic than the first. Then again, it's not all about Yahweh's judgement in the first Isaiah. In Chapter 19 after the Lord riding on a swift cloud (a theophany) comes to Egypt and delivers them into the hands of their enemies, this is what unexpectedly happens: "On that day there will be an altar to the Lord in the center of the land of Egypt, and a pillar to the Lord at its border. It will be a sign and a witness to the Lord of hosts in the land of Egypt; when they cry to the Lord because of oppressors, he will send them a savior, and will defend and deliver them. 21 The Lord will make himself known to the Egyptians; and the Egyptians will know the Lord on that day". A most surprising prophesy.




