HOMELESS MINISTRY

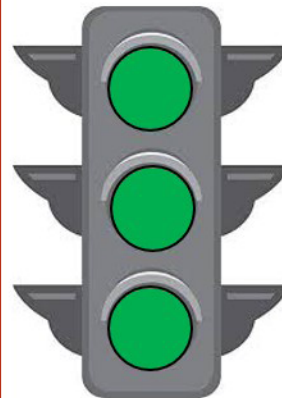
Throughout the Covid-19 pandemic we have been fortunate to continue to provide limited lunches for three locations. Just last week we provided 177 lunches for these locations.

MEET ORGANIST JJ MITCHELL



Recently named to the Diapason magazine's 2021 Class of "20 Under 30," John Joseph "JJ" Mitchell, an organist from Arlington, Virginia, has a passion for organ and sacred music pedagogy. He is pursuing a Doctorate in Musical Arts in Organ Performance from the University of Houston (UH) on a Graduate Tuition Fellowship. In addition to serving as Church Organist at CTS, he serves as an organist of St. Philip Presbyterian Church, also in Houston, and is a graduate teaching assistant in the Music History Department at UH.

Recently, JJ was appointed to the faculty of UH's Community Arts Academy, providing organ lessons to students in the local Houston area. JJ graduated Summa Cum Laude from Westminster Choir College with a bachelor's degree in Sacred Music. He then earned his Master of Sacred Music degree in Organ Performance from the University of Notre Dame, where he attended on a full-tuition scholarship. He also studied at the Conservatoire à Rayonnement Régional de Toulouse (France).

JJ has served as organist on the music staff of churches such as Christ Church Cathedral (Houston, TX), the Cathedral of St. Thomas More (Arlington, VA) and the Basilica of the Sacred Heart (South Bend, IN). He has performed in these churches as well as at Boston Symphony Hall, the DeBartolo Performing Arts Center, and various other churches in the United States, Canada, France, and England. He is the winner of the Nanovic Grant for European Study for Professional Development and was a finalist for the Frank Huntington Beebe Grant. At age 24, JJ's research on César Franck and his musical influences was published in the Vox Humana

Organ Journal. In September 2020, he was a guest on Dr. Jennifer Pascual's "Sounds from the Spires" SiriusXM Radio program in which his organ recordings were broadcast. JJ is a member of the American Guild of Organists as well as the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM), from which he has received several scholarships. He has served on NPM's National Publications Committee since 2017. JJ's ideal career is to be a director of music at a cathedral where he will teach sacred music to the next generation.

COUNCIL COMMENTARY

The Christ the Servant (CTS) council's most recent meeting was held on Thursday, March 11th. The council unanimously approved a revised version of the Death Benefit Addendum to the CTS Employee Handbook. The revisions were made solely to clarify the language of the addendum.

An employment offer was extended to Mr. John (JJ) Mitchell, a PhD candidate at the Moores School of Music at the University of Houston, as CTS' temporary organist. Mr. Mitchell will play for Sunday worship services, and all services during Holy Week. His position with CTS will be subject to review following the initial three-month temporary employment period.

The council wishes to extend its thanks to D.J. Blockhus, who was instrumental in securing heaters for the "Neighbors in Action" initiative during our recent week of unseasonably cold weather and power outages. The group sponsoring the initiative was very grateful for CTS' contribution and sends its gratitude to the entire congregation.

The council also wishes to thank Ken Smith for his work in leading the CTS initiative for God's Work, Our Hands, particularly at a time when meeting in person remains a material challenge. Please look for further communication regarding how CTS congregation members may get involved.

In an update from last month, the CTS council determined it will be unable to meet the March 31st deadline to apply for a loan under the current Payroll Protection Program being administered by the U.S. Federal government. However, as there may be future programs, the CTS council is considering convening a congregational meeting to discuss and vote on whether the congregation would approve of engaging this type of loan. Please look for future communications regarding a possible congregational meeting in the future.

In light of the changing environment regarding Covid-19, the CTS council discussed CTS' current protocol surrounding in-person activities at CTS, including worship services. Following its discussion, the council decided to maintain CTS' existing Covid-19 protocol for the present time. However, given the rapidly changing environment, the protocol will be reviewed on an ongoing basis. As more CTS congregation members become fully vaccinated, it is anticipated that a return to a more normal protocol will eventually be possible. Please note that streaming services will be maintained for the foreseeable future to enable those congregation members wishing to do so to worship from home.

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

Parables of Jesus

Here are some ideas/impressions from selected parables we studied last month in Adult Sunday School.

The Lost Sheep - Matthew 18:12-14 and Luke 15:4-7

We all remember this parable where the shepherd leaves the 99 to look for the one lost sheep. In Matthew's version, the lost sheep could have been any one of the flock but is later identified as one of the little ones. Matthew's version emphasizes the recovery of the one lost or led astray. In Luke, the man (not specifically identified as a shepherd) rejoices when he finds the lost sheep. He is so happy he calls his friends together to join in the celebration.

The Lost Coin - Luke 15:8-10

This parable is often considered a "twin" of The Lost Sheep. This parable is remarkable in that it portrays a woman as a metaphor for God. In the parable, the woman lights a lamp, sweeps the house and searches diligently until she finds the lost coin. Then she calls her friends and neighbors and invites them to celebrate with her. Luke concludes this parable with a closing comment that God's angels rejoice over even one sinner who repents. This is very similar to the closing comment in Luke for The Lost Sheep. Hultgren makes an interesting point in that the lost coin is an inert object and had nothing to do with its being discovered! I think we can all relate to stories about searching for missing things ... I look for something misplaced several times a week and generally find the missing object ... often with my wife's help of course.

The Rich Fool - Luke 12:16-21

The rich man land produces grain in such abundance that he decides to pull down his barns and build bigger barns to store all his grain and his goods. He then plans to take it easy and to "eat, drink and be merry". God responds by saying "Fool! This night your soul is required of you." The fool has placed all his trust and faith in his possessions. The call of God and the need of neighbors were apparently absent from this rich man's life. Of course, we never fall into this trap of accumulating wealth for say retirement ... I'm not so sure about that.

The Treasure in the Field - Matthew 13:44

The kingdom of heaven is compared to treasure hidden in a field, which a person finds, hides it then sells all that he has and buys that field. The main point of this similitude per Hultgren is that the disciple of Jesus responds to the kingdom with a commitment that risks all without reserve.

The Pearl of Great Price - Matthew 13:45-46

In this parable, the kingdom of heaven is compared to a merchant looking for fine pearls and when he had found one of extraordinary value, he sold all that he had and bought it. This parable is considered a "twin" of The Treasure in the Field. It is interesting that pearls were considered in some instances more valuable than gold in

the first century A.D. The merchant was looking for pearls while the person wasn't looking for treasure in the previous parable. In this parable, the pearl discovered by merchant was of extraordinary value. Those seeking the kingdom who do in fact discover it will find something far greater than one could have imagined.

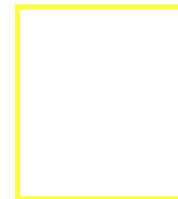
